Last weekend's Improv Night raised more than \$1,000 to support a school in South Sudan that our high school students have been working with for the past three years.

The High School Peace Group organized the evening, performing improv skits and musical performances for a full Festival Hall audience to raise money for the Duk Payuel School. The student-inspired, service-learning group started working with Daniel Duol, a Colorado Lost Boy, three years ago.

Daniel has taught the students about the importance of universal education in working to alleviate poverty and to promote peace throughout all regions of the world through his own story, ranging from his childhood during the Sudanese Civil War, his new life in Colorado, and his work to bring education back to the children of his home in Sudan.

The Peace Group learns about different obstacles to peace and ways to promote it throughout communities, locally, nationally and globally, such as through increasing universal access to education. In addition to the Duk Payuel School, the students work with the Lakota Waldorf School on the Pine Ridge Reservation in

North Dakota; they organize school events to promote peace and understanding of others within their own community; and they work to diminish their own environmental impact and help promote sustainability in the Front Range. Each action starts with education.

The students learn through a weekly elective class that focuses on topics that promote peace. The class also teachers the students how to effectively work within communities, how to look at both the immediate need and the root cause of issues acting as obstacles to peace, and empowers the students to affect change.



The Peace Group class incorporates education from a collection of resources. In addition to connections with local nonprofits, the group also incorporates the Peace Jam curriculum, which connects youth with Nobel Peace Laureates. Most recently, the Peace Group started working with the Student Peace Alliance, a national organization that works to promote peace within schools, largely through Restorative Practices.

How You Can Support the Work of the High School Peace Group

In addition to the Peace Group's annual improv show, the students also have a section in the school store where they sell hand-made items to raise funding to support their work. The students create and sell



artwork, T-shirts, soaps, seasonally themed cards, and more. Next week the group will release the new season's cards in the school store! Post-holidays, this set of cards features Thank-You cards, winter-themed and New Year-themed artwork. Come check them out and get your thank-you cards and New Year cards from the Peace Group. TURBO TEENS: DOUGLAS GERWIN, PH.D



On Tuesday, Jan. 14, The Denver Waldorf School welcomed Douglas Gerwin, Ph.D for an evening of insight and perspective on the challenging work of supporting adolescents in their academic and personal development. Below is a brief summary of his presentation—we hope you'll join us at parent education events in the near future!

This generation of teens was born into a world with:

Home computers & advanced technology Cell phones

The decline of the 9-5 workday – parents are always on call

Cyberbullying

9/11 and other shocking acts of terrorism in the country and around the world

that school is an unsafe place to be

As parents/teachers, we also need to embrace modern life, and let our children feel that they can be successful in the circumstances into which they were born.

How are teens different today?

In general, today's teens are showing an acceleration of their physical growth accompanied by a deceleration of their psychological development.

Physical Differences:

Taller

Earlier onset of puberty

More allergies

More auto-immune disorders

Increased incidences of obesity or anorexia

Sensory sensitivities

Delayed executive function skills

Psychological Differences:

Increased incidences of depression, ADHD Lack of personal discipline and family structure Apathy – either not caring or not knowing what to care

Heightened global and environmental consciousness Increased fear and sense of instability

How can we meet their needs?

Slow education – learning through the will, rather than just the nerve-sense/intellect.

Arts-based education – reaching the students' lungs and heart: the breath; the imagination.

Imagination-based activities – teaching children to move between their own perspective and the perspective of another

Help them develop the capacity to see things in the world as part of a coherent whole by balancing their fragmentation; let them discover this coherence out of their own judgment

What are teens looking for?

Meaning in the world True love (not necessarily for another person; perhaps for a passion, a dream, an endeavor) Discovery of their purpose or task in life

Columbine and other school shootings, and the sense How can we help teens find what they're looking

Give them the wisdom to find meaning in the world. Give them the courage to find love through the arts. Give them the wisdom, courage, resilience, strength of volition and will to discover their purpose for themselves: the most difficult of the three.

What is the best predictor of success in college & how can we help teens develop this skill?

A high executive function score is the best predictor of college success. Unstructured play (at all age levels) is the single most powerful way we can help our children develop their executive function.

What should the goal of adolescent education be to support their development?

In many schools, the current model is a stimulus-response format that emphasizes an input-output style of learning. Weighing, judging, and feeling connected to the action of learning is not emphasized.

By contrast, we should be shifting the role of education away from the nerve-sense based, strictly intellectual approach and towards educating the students' metabolism, volition and movement ability to bring some balance to learning that gradually awakens the intellect when students are ready.

ACT Test Prep

Test prep for the ACT is just around the corner and we have a full house! Thanks to Prilla O'Connell for taking on the task of preparing our students. The class will begin the first Wednesday of February at 3:00 sharp, lasting approximately 1 to 1.5 hours. The class will finish right before the ACT test in April. Sign up early to avoid late fees:

ACT Dates: April 14, 2014 & June 12, 2014

SAT Dates: March 8, 2014, May 3, 2014 & June 7, 2014

Mike McHenry and I encourage the students to try both tests out to see which suits them and their learning style better. Each has a different approach, and depending on your student, one may suit better than the other. The ACT tests students on what they know, while the SAT is geared toward the critical thinker. Some may call the SAT "trickier", as it challenges the student's ability to discern the difference between a mostly right answer and THE right answer. Make sense? Please feel free to call or email me with testing questions. The school has chosen the ACT to prep for as the SAT is undergoing some major revamping in the years to come.

Important: College Night for Junior Parents Thurs., February 6 at 7:00 pm

On Thursday February 6, there will be a college meeting for parents of the Junior class. Mike McHenry and I will discuss the process, how to find a good fit for your student, what to expect and all the other ins and outs of the college process. We will discuss differences in Early Decision vs. Early Action, financial aid vs. merit aid and a whole host of issues. Bring your questions! The meeting will begin at 7 upstairs in the High School.

Gap Year Fair

This year's <u>Gap Year Fair</u> will be held at Denver Academy on Sunday, January 19th from 1:00 to 3:30 pm. This is a great opportunity to look into all the wonderful programs for students to participate in between high school and college. We will discuss Gap Year on College Night as well – many schools today encourage their incoming freshmen to take a year to mature and experience the world outside the classroom.
